Caregivers of older adults 60+

Caregivers of adults any age with dementia


Caregivers age 55+ of adults with disabilities age 18-59

*Caregivers age 55+ of children under the age of 18

*Other Eligibility Criteria

- Does not include biological parents, and bio parents cannot live in the same home
- Includes grandparents raising grandchildren or "grandfamilies"
- Includes caregivers related by blood, marriage or legal agreement (adoption)
- Caregivers and children must live in the same home


What about kinship caregivers?



- The term kinship refers to grandparents and other relatives, neighbors and friends who care for children when their parents can not.
- Sometimes these families are licensed through the child welfare or foster care system. Other times, they have stepped into the role on a more temporary or informal basis.
- Common reasons include parental substance abuse, death, incarceration, mental illness, severe disability, poverty or deployment.

Children in Grandfamilies and Kinship Families

For every 1 child
being raised by kin in
foster care, there are
18 children being
raised by kin outside
foster care.





Statewide

33,000 children are being raised by a relative or kinship caregiver without a parent in the home.

29,452 grandparents are raising grandchildren.

Kinship Navigator Networks




Caregivers choose from a list of approved YMCA Day Camps throughout the region, and the base fees are waived for children ages 5-12.

GRANDPass gives older care givers:

- Freedom to learn and grow
- Access to the outdoors

First Year Facts

Total applications: 37 (60 children)

Approved applications: 18 (24 children)

Incomplete/ineligible applications: 19

Biggest reasons for denial: Age of children (10)

Cost: \$150-175/week


